Teachers performance at cultural programme

On Saturday 10th April supporters joined with the children, young people, parents, and teachers of the Khasdobir Project by zoom for a programme of songs, dance, and poetry.

During the programme children from one of our pre-primary schools sang a song about the rivers of Bangladesh. Children from another school performed a dance. We also saw pictures of the National fruits and flowers of Bangladesh drawn by the children.

The sewing class students performed a dance and song and we viewed some of the clothes patterns they had created from newspaper during the first part of their course.

One of the students of the computer class sang a popular rock song and we viewed business cards and forms created by the students during their class.

News from the Project

106 children from our centres will transfer to Primary Schools

In January 2021 106 children from our schools completed their pre-primary education. They will now transfer to Government Primary Schools, Primary Schools on the tea gardens and Madrassa (Government regulated schools run by Islamic faith organisations). The children all received a certificate after completing their pre-primary schooling with the Project. Our Project Monitoring Officer liaised with the primary schools to arrange places for the children. Teachers and outreach workers helped parents with the application procedure. The children will all start school as soon as they re-open following the current lock down due to COVID 19 in Sylhet.

The situation regarding COVID 19 in Sylhet

Bangladesh is currently experiencing a second wave of covid 19 with new variants of the virus including those originating in the UK and South Africa. Sylhet City is one of the most severely affected parts of Bangladesh and a stricter "lock down" has recently been introduced with all offices and schools closed. This

includes our pre-primary centres. The vaccination programme is under way in Bangladesh and our outreach team have been helping the parents and guardians of children attending our pre-primary centres to register to receive a vaccine.

Distribution of devices to assist mobility



At the beginning of March the project distributed devices to assist mobility to children in the Khasdobir area who had been assessed as being able to benefit from a device. Our new trustee, Dulon Miah, took part in the distribution ceremony and he also arranged for more devices to be provided through the organisation Sylhet Aid. Jalabad Disabled Rehabilitation Centre, based in Sylhet also funded the purchase of some devices. Some trustees in the UK joined the event by zoom.

Trustee Virtual Monitoring Visits

In the absence of opportunities for Trustees to visit the project, a series of meetings with the project staff were held in February using Zoom! The purpose was to review recent developments, the impact of COVID and progress in the various areas of work – pre-schools, outreach, vocational training. There is a summary below, and further information will be available at the Annual Meeting.

Follow up from last Trustee visit:

There were 16 recommendations made last year and staff from the project provided information and documentation to demonstrate the progress made. Overall Trustees were delighted with the amount of work and dedication shown by all the staff. Clearly COVID has had a major impact but nevertheless preschools have opened for most of the period albeit with reduced class sizes. The building of two new shelters has made a significant difference to the learning opportunities for children in very deprived areas, as have the improvements elsewhere.

The 5 new shelters are starting to be used by the wider community. Training courses continue to provide valuable skills and staff shared examples of students who have gone on to employment or selfemployment.

Meeting with Outreach Workers:

A group of Trustees met with the Outreach team to assess the impact of their work and were told work continues despite COVID limitations. The two workers visit poor families in the Tea Gardens and slum areas of Sylhet to assess needs and raise awareness of benefits available to them. This includes help with obtaining birth certificates that are essential to access many government services, identifying pre-school children for admission to our schools, and helping those who have dropped out of the system to enter Second Chance Schools. Arrangements are made for immunisation and children in need of medical help are referred to Hospital.

Training

We met Sheila, the sewing teacher, and one of her students. The current group of students started in January and the course lasts a year. There are six students in each class to allow for social distancing, and this was their tenth session. They were currently learning hand sewing techniques and one of the students showed us her work buttonholes and embroidery. She told us she was enjoying the course.

We also met the computer class teacher and heard that the key objective of the computer class is to provide practical learning on computer operations to up-skill poor and deprived students to enable them to apply such skills in employment or as freelancers. There are 40 students on the programme organised into six groups. Each group attends the course two days per week. The age range is 14-30 and there are boys and girls on the course. Most do not have a laptop at home and are therefore unable to practise between classes, but some come into the office to practise when they can. Three students have already found jobs benefitting from the course and the computer teacher felt there are prospects in graphic design and marketing.
